#### Lenten Activities at St. John's

It teaches us how to pray the Scriptures, especially the Gospels, so that they come alive for us, here and now, offering us peace no matter what our circumstances are.

## 2017-18 School Supply Project for Area Schools

Coordinated by: Society of St. Vincent de Paul (Maggie Kenny)

Financially supported by: Wolfville Area InterChurch Council for students in their catchment area

This program helped a total of 69 students from seven different schools with supplies and/or fees for the 2017-18 school year. Our program has been active for many years, and since 2008, we are very pleased to have the Wolfville Area Interchurch Council (WAICC) and local churches support us financially with this endeavor.

All local elementary schools grades primary to grade 5 charge a school supply fee, with children only needing to supply a backpack, lunch box, indoor footwear, gym clothes, and for many schools, a water bottle. Our program has been accustomed to only supplying the backpack and lunchbox from the above list and have continued to do so. The supply fees collected by the schools are used to purchases supplies that the students will need throughout the year. Some schools also charge a school fee for locker rentals, fine arts programs, etc. We pay any associated fees directly to the schools. School Administrations also put forth names they recommend we support, some of which are struggling families who do not use the services of the local Foodbanks or the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. The school makes contact with these families for consent. Of note, Horton High School waived their \$25 fee for their fourteen students again this year, choosing to absorb the cost (\$350) through their own budget.

Over the recent years, the NS government has given each school extra funds to be used for programming for students from struggling families. This money can be used to cover fees, and could be the reason for the continued decrease in demand for support regarding school fees and supplies, as well as the efforts of various businesses supporting students through their own projects. (Bell Alliant, Sleep Country, County Fair Mall, etc)

Sodexho, the Physical Plant at Acadia University, continues to play a very important role in that they recover used supplies from students for us to recycle and reuse, cutting down on our purchases. We continue to receive more binders than we can give out in a year, but store these extra, thinking that university students will buy less of these in the future, as so much of their work is now electronic.

We continue to carry an inventory of supplies do to donations that come in and items purchased on sale. We purchase supplies in the summer when the sales are "good". We have to predict our needs. This year, we predicted more support would be needed than was actually requested, resulting in a larger end of program inventory to draw on for next year.

Backpacks continue to be a costly item, and do not last from year to year, making up a bulk of our expenses, along with lunch boxes and calculators.

Some families requested support with fees only. Some families requested support with supplies only. Some families requested support in all areas.

Making connections with families over the summer has become increasingly difficult and an issue that needs some fine tuning. Many families rely solely on text messages to correspond. It appears some
